Short Answer Key:

- 9. The poet conveys the theme of forgotten memories by presenting the key as a symbol of past experiences and secrets that have been left behind and are now only remembered in the context of the old, neglected object.
- 10. The overall message of the poem is that the lost key represents the passage of time and the way memories and important aspects of the past can become forgotten, symbolizing both the loss and the potential for rediscovery.



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
