Short Answer Key:

- 1. The poet personifies the clock tower by describing it as watching, dancing, and lamenting, giving it human-like qualities that reflect its enduring presence and awareness of time.
- 2. The imagery in "Echoing beneath the pale moon" creates a peaceful and somewhat melancholic atmosphere, emphasizing the quiet, reflective nature of the poem.
- 3. The rhyme scheme of the first stanza is ABAB.
- 4. The poet creates a sense of time passing through phrases like "The clock ticks on" and "years and decades circle round," which highlight the continuous, unstoppable movement of time.
